



HOW TO USE THE GERUND IN ENGLISH

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WHAT IS THE GERUND?



The gerund is a verbal form that ends in "-ing" and is used as a noun. In other words, it is the verb with the "-ing" ending. For example, in the word "eating," "eating" is the gerund of the verb "eat."



HOW TO FORM THE GERUND:

COMMON MISTAKE:

- Be careful not to confuse gerunds with present participles, which are verb forms that also end in "-ing" but are used in different ways. The gerund functions as a noun, while the present participle functions as part of a verb tense.
