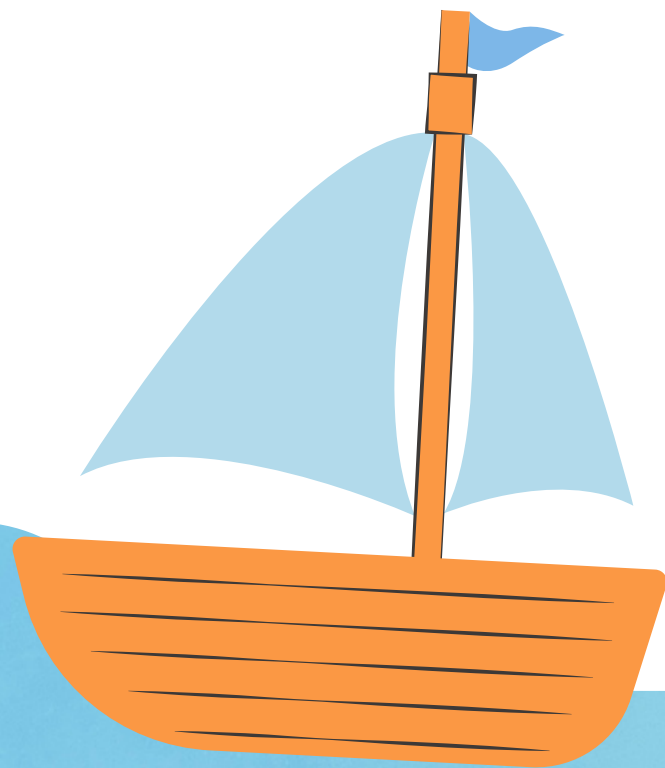

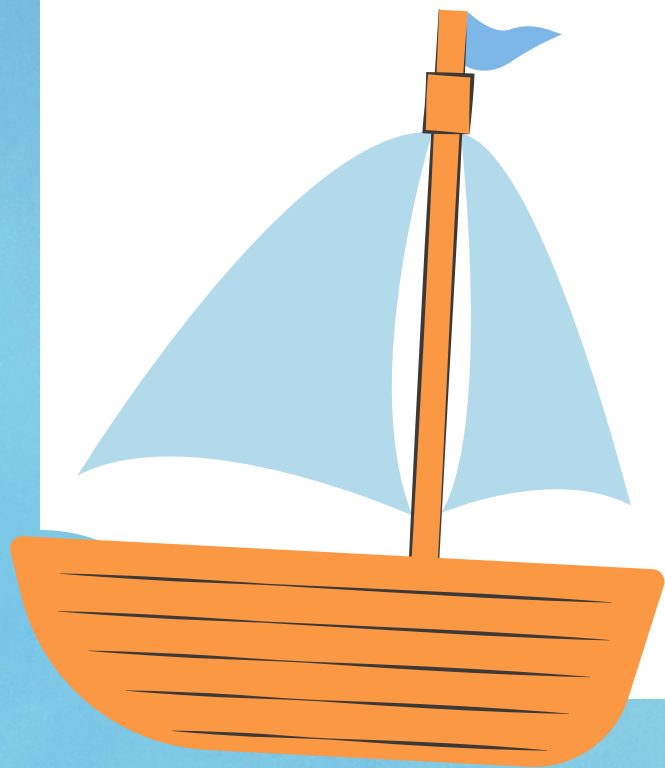

We may use the following grammar structures:

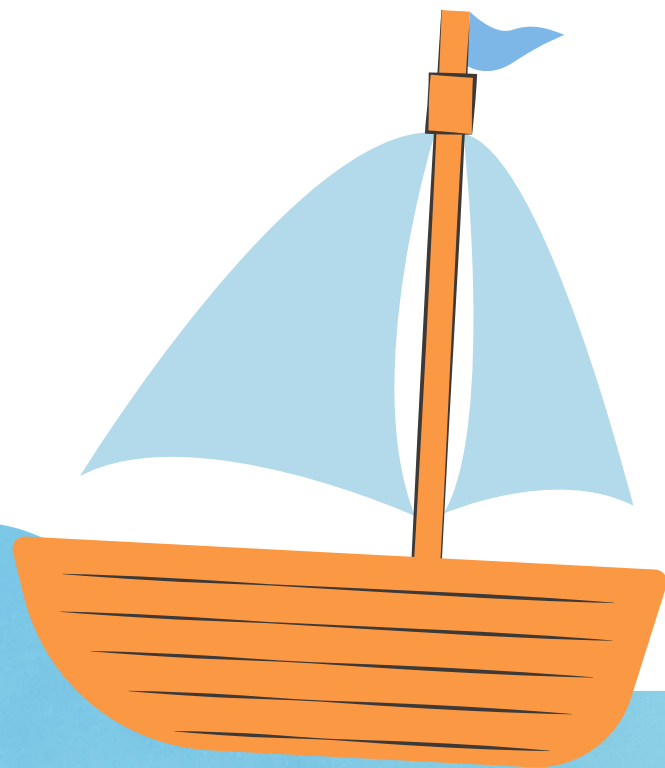
Present simple, Present continuous, going to, Future simple, Future Continuous, Future Perfect Simple



PRESENT SIMPLE

timetabled events

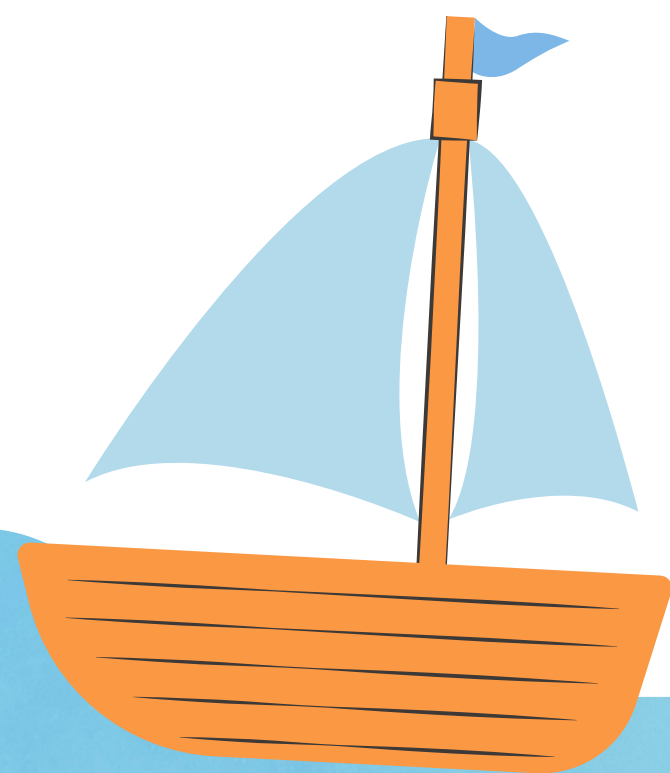
The modern art exhibition

PRESENT CONTINUOUS

fixed or personal arrangements

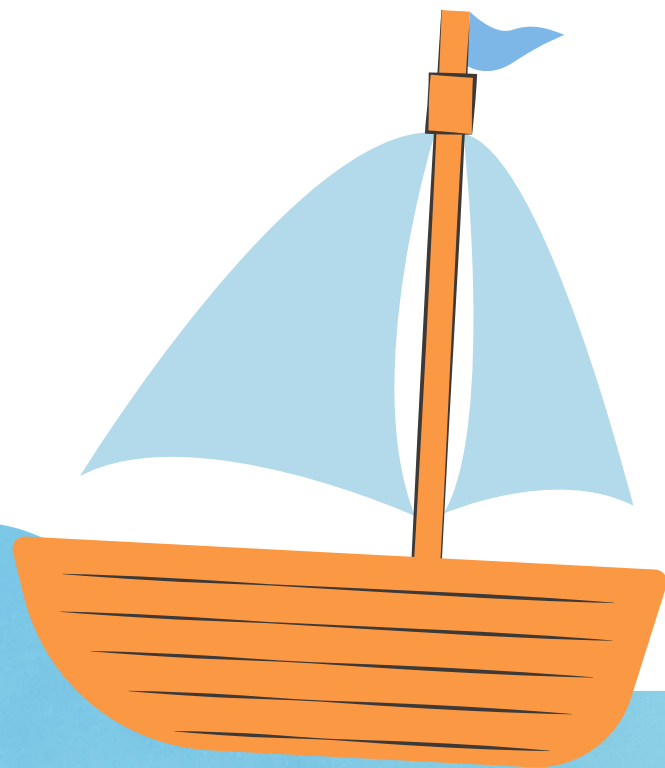
I'm climbing Mont Blanc next month. Do you want to come?



GOING TO

plans, or predictions based on present evidence

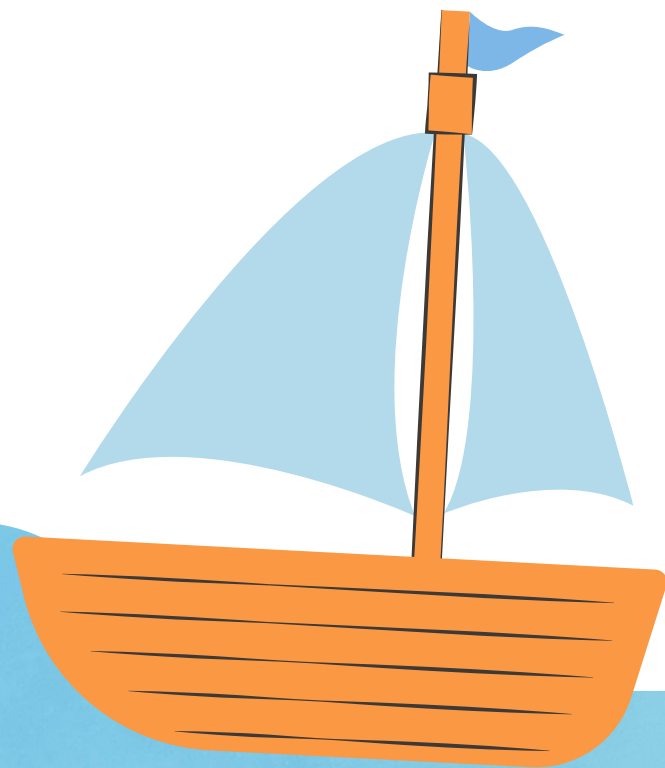
It's getting late, we aren't going to get there on time.



FUTURE SIMPLE

decisions made at the time of speaking

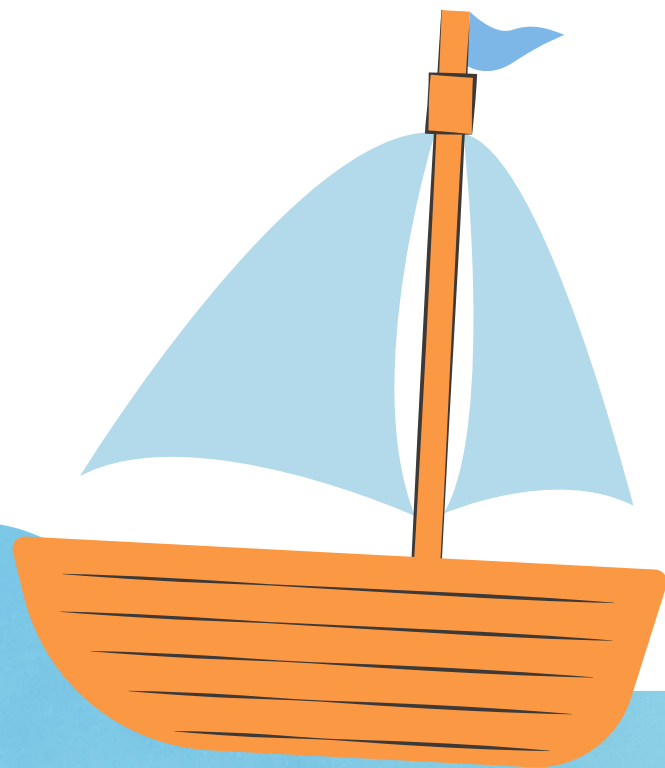
We ran out of milk. I'll get some at my way to work.



FUTURE SIMPLE

predictions without present evidence

He'll be a great singer some day.



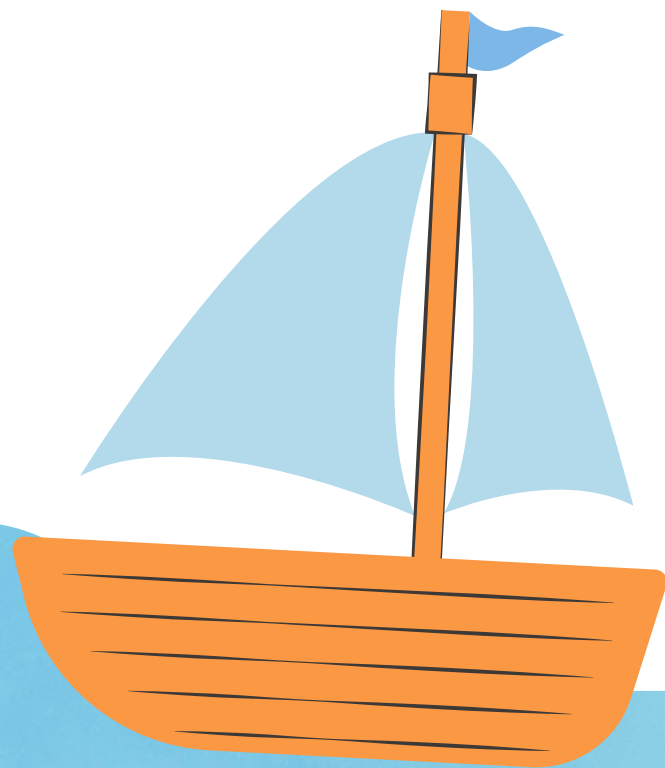
FUTURE SIMPLE

hopes, promises, offers

I hope it won't rain tomorrow.

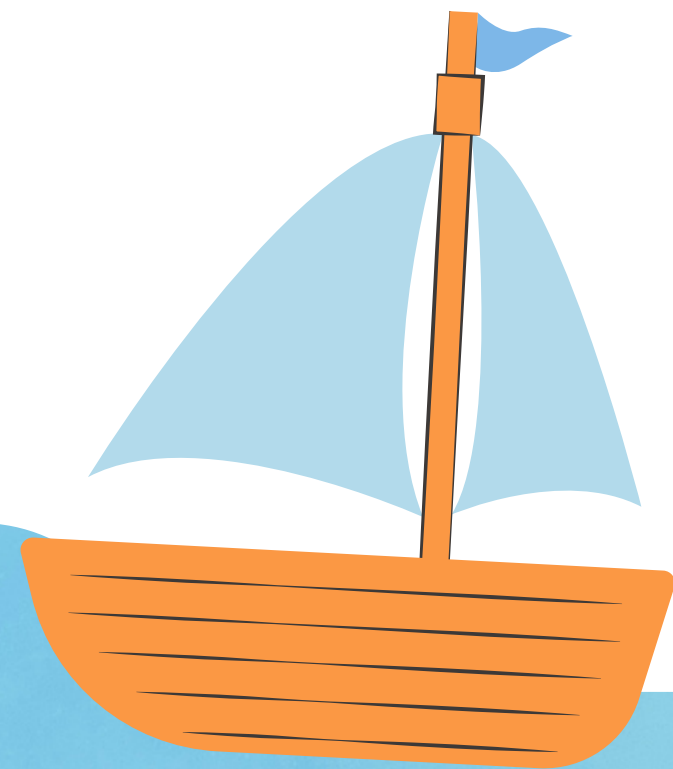
I'll call when I get there.

I'll lend you some money.



FUTURE CONTINUOUS

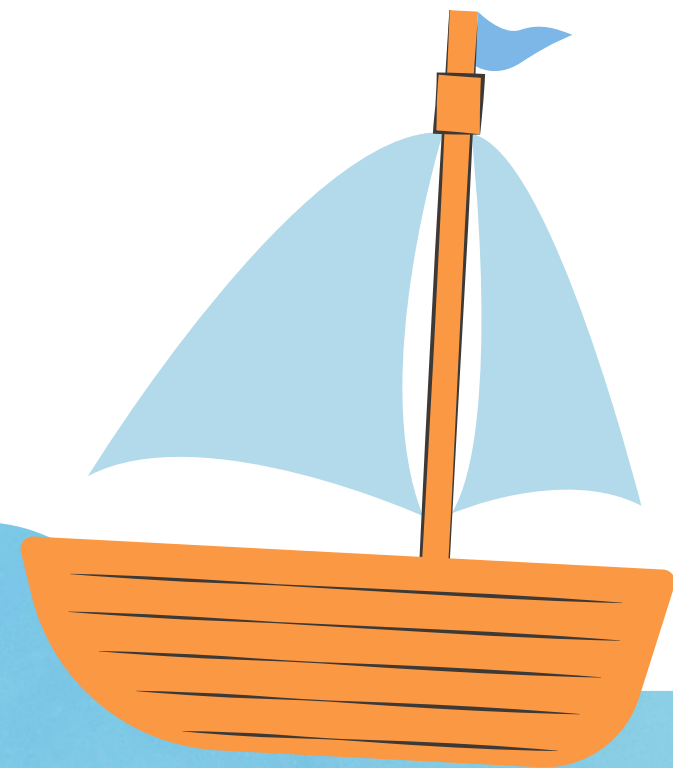
actions that will be in progress at a certain time in the future



This time next year I'll be running the New York Marathon.

FUTURE PERFECT SIMPLE

actions that will be completed before a
certain time in the future



By the end of this year, I will have
graduated from high school.
